



**First Substantial Amendment to the  
48<sup>th</sup> Program Year (2022-23) Housing and Community Development Consolidated Annual Plan  
(48-01)**

**Reprogramming for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and  
Emergency Solutions Grant CARES Act (ESG-CV)**

Purpose

In accordance with the Code of Federal Regulations (found under 24 CFR Parts 91.105 and 91.505), and the City's Citizen Participation Plan, the City of Los Angeles is required to provide citizens with an opportunity to comment on all proposed Substantial Amendments to its Housing and Community Development Consolidated Annual Plan (Con Plan). The City wishes to notify the public of a substantial amendment to its 48<sup>th</sup> Program Year (PY 48) 2022-23 Con Plan.

For the Community Development Block Grant, a 30-day public comment period will provide the public with an opportunity to review and comment on this proposed amendment, beginning about October 17, 2022 and ending on November 20, 2022.

For the Emergency Solutions Grant Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act, the federal legislation exempts this grant from an official public comment period, and this notice is to provide information on changes.

Proposed Changes – Community Development Block Grant

Since the City Council and Mayor adopted the PY 48 Con Plan budget on June 20, 2022, changes have been identified and are proposed for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG).

- A) Funding for the Restoration Community Development Corporation Shower Trailer Program in the amount of \$516,125 that was awarded in a prior program year is being reprogrammed due to federal requirements, and will support another project in the 8<sup>th</sup> Council District, Martin Luther King Jr. Park.
- B) Additional CDBG resources in the amount of \$2,134,000, made available as savings from completed projects funded in prior years, are also proposed to be reprogrammed. Table 1 lists the projects proposed to receive funding.

- C) Homeboy Industries – Feed Hope was awarded \$500,000, and the purpose of the funding is clarified. Instead of rehabilitation and capital improvements at the Homegirl Cafe, the funds will be used for acquisition of a building in Lincoln Heights and construction to improve the property for use as a production kitchen to support food insecurity initiatives and disaster relief as well as reentry training for formerly incarcerated and gang impacted individuals.
- D) Pallet Shelters was awarded \$8,000,000 in CDBG CARES funding in a prior year. The locations are proposed to be changed from three sites in Council Districts 1, 6, and 14, to three sites in Council Districts 6, 13 and 14.

Proposed Change – Emergency Solutions Grant CARES

The City of Los Angeles was awarded an additional amount of \$1,299,073 from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. This is in addition to the \$183,598,712 received in 2020. The funding will be used to prevent, prepare for, and respond to coronavirus, among individuals and families who are homeless or receiving homeless assistance and to support additional homeless assistance and homelessness prevention activities to mitigate the impacts created by coronavirus under the Emergency Solutions Grants program. The funds will provide temporary hotel and motel vouchers for persons in need of shelter.
