### **1. Introduction**

Organizations consulted on the development of the Annual Action Plan included key partners in homeless prevention and reduction efforts, highlighting the key issue affecting Los Angeles.

### **Provide a concise summary of the jurisdiction’s activities to enhance coordination between public and assisted housing providers and private and governmental health, mental health and service agencies (91.215(l))**

#### **Public Housing Coordination**

The Housing Authority of the City of Los Angeles (HACLA) launched its 25 Year Vision Plan in 2018 which seeks to promote collaborative strategic partnerships across sectors for residents living in HACLA’s government-assisted housing. This plan aligns with the City of Los Angeles’ initiatives and seeks to ensure that all Angelenos have access to resources to enhance their quality of life. To this end, HACLA has secured a few grants that will propel this effort. Through its WorkSource Center, HACLA was awarded the Community Health Worker Demonstration grant at Nickerson Gardens which will promote health services and employment in the allied health field for vulnerable populations, and which created the Health Equity and Access Collaborative. This collaborative is mirrored after the federal Interdepartmental Health Equity Collaborative which has cross-sector partners in health, housing, education, services etc. HACLA is seeking to determine if partners can leverage resources for the other three housing developments in Watts. This collaborative has garnered the attention of LA County Departments of Mental Health, Public Health and Social Services, and is poised for creating solutions to LA County’s community-based research on women’s health equity outcomes.

Under the Section 8 umbrella of assistance, HACLA administered multiple housing assistance programs to provide affordable, permanent, supportive housing for chronically homeless individuals and families with high supportive needs who are not current consumers of on-going health and mental health services by providing rental subsidies and supportive services through a collaborative effort with local service providers. These housing assistance programs include the Continuum of Care (CoC), HUD-VASH, Waiting List Limited Preferences for Homeless (WL LP Homeless), Waiting List Limited Preference Tenant Based Supportive Housing Program (WL LP TBSH), Waiting List Limited Preference LAUSD (WL LP LAUSD), and Project Based Voucher – Permanent Supportive Housing Program (PBV – PSHP). HACLA partnered with more than 20 agencies that provide supportive services to families, including but not limited to:

**Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.**

**Continuum of Care Coordination**

LAHSA serves as the Los Angeles Continuum of Care (LA CoC) Collaborative Applicant, ESG subrecipient, Coordinated Entry administrator, and the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) lead for the LA CoC. LAHSA provides data to participating jurisdictions to include in their respective Annual Plans, including point-in-time count results, HMIS coverage, housing inventory and utilization, system performance measures and recommendations on performance standards. In addition, LAHSA participates in public meetings to gather community input to inform Annual Action Plan and Con Plans.

Additionally, there are several initiatives underway meant to increase CoC coordination and linkages between institutions and programs, including:

- Bridge housing models that link more robust supportive services and long-term housing.
- Enhanced linkages to mainstream resources throughout the homeless service system by identifying and removing barriers that people experience.
- Working with LA City and LA County partners to enhance diversion practices and identify opportunities to resolve housing crises within other systems of care/outside of the homeless service system.
- Enhanced linkages to support those exiting other systems of care, including re-entry from the criminal justice system, hospitals, and the child welfare system.

- Development of policy and service standards across funders, providers, and geography, and the implementation of training that ensures the consistent deployment of homeless service system resources.
- Development of municipal guidance to help improve local responses to unsheltered homelessness that involve frequent displacement and disruption to service connection, such as encampment clearings, fines, and citations.

**Describe consultation with the Continuum(s) of Care that serves the jurisdiction's area in determining how to allocate ESG funds, develop performance standards for and evaluate outcomes of projects and activities assisted by ESG funds, and develop funding, policies and procedures for the operation and administration of HMIS**

LAHSA consults with ESG direct and other subrecipients in the LA CoC – LA City and County, El Monte, and Pomona – to plan and allocate ESG funds. Staff work closely with recipients to identify gaps in services and strategize how ESG funds could fill those gaps. This is particularly the case for the City and County of LA as LAHSA implements ESG programs on their behalf and uses the consultations to pinpoint where funds are most needed.

As the LA CoC’s lead agency, LAHSA conducts quarterly community meetings in each of the eight regions or Service Planning Areas (SPA) to obtain input and feedback on the effectiveness of programs and the accomplishment of outcomes. Service providers, elected officials, and community members participate in the community meetings as focused, ongoing dialogues with the community to support the continuous quality improvement of the LA CoC system of care.

As the LA HMIS system administrator, LAHSA oversees the coordinated implementation of the countywide HMIS. The HMIS Collaborative, which include the CoCs of LA, Glendale, and Pasadena, reviews the progress of implementation, identifies and resolves problems, updates policies and procedures, and reviews reports from HMIS participating service providers. The adopted policies and procedures ensure that HMIS serves the following purposes:

- Prioritize the sharing of client-level data across jurisdictions,
- Aggregate data on a regional and sub-regional basis,
- Facilitate the coordination of service delivery for homeless persons,
- Enable agencies to track referrals and services provided, report outcomes, and manage client data using accessible, user-friendly and secured technology; and,
- Enhance the ability of policy makers and advocates to gauge the extent of homelessness and plan services appropriately throughout the county.

Each HMIS partner is required to comply with the following:

- Designate a point-person to contact regarding project management issues;

- Ensure participating agencies and users receive Collaborative-approved training prior to obtaining system access;
- Jointly create, with the intention of adopting, HMIS policies and procedures;
- Maintain a process to hear and address issues from users under its domain;
- In situations where users operate programs in multiple Continuum of Care systems, the participants responsible for those systems agree to work jointly to address problems and concerns.

### 1. Summary of citizen participation process/Efforts made to broaden citizen participation

#### Summarize citizen participation process and how it impacted goal-setting

In the fall of 2019, the Housing + Community Investment Department of Los Angeles (HCIDLA) hosted one public meeting to gather community input on the 2020-21 Annual Action Plan, with an attendance of over 100, and held 13 focus groups with various stakeholders. Due to the global pandemic and the restrictions put in place to slow its spread, different measures were taken to gather public input in the spring of 2020. HCIDLA held an online survey to gather public input on the Mayor’s proposed budget; a total of 598 people took part. Lastly, a special City Council Housing Committee meeting was held virtually which included public comments on the proposed budget.

#### Locations, Dates, and Times

October 1, 2019, 6:00 to 7:30 PM., Los Angeles Trade Technical College (LATTC), 400 West Washington Blvd, Los Angeles, CA 90015

The location was chosen for its concentration of low-income residents, racial and ethnic minority residents, and non-English speaking residents, and as an area where CDBG funds are proposed for use. It was also chosen for its access to public transportation, disability access, and ability to accommodate a Con Plan meeting. Professional Spanish interpretation was conducted at the meeting, and Communication Access Real-time Translation captioning was provided for persons with hearing impairment. The special City Council Housing Committee meeting was held on June 4, 2020, 11:00 AM, and was held virtually with telephone access for the public.

**Notifying Citizens**

HCIDLA coordinated with the Mayor’s office, City Council Districts, FamilySource Centers, Public Libraries, Recreation and Parks Department, the Neighborhood Councils, other City departments, and the network of community-based organizations that have partnered with the City, to promote the meeting to constituents. Outreach methods included mass email notifications to around 25,000 subscribers, advertising on the HCIDLA website, public announcements on City Channel 35, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and publication of an official notice per HUD regulations. Outreach flyers were provided in English and Spanish.

**October Public Meeting Format**

An overview of the Con Plan was presented, including what the grants can be used for, the programs and projects that have been funded, and the timeline for developing the plan. Since interest was high in previous years, presentations on the development of affordable housing and on economic development were also given.

Throughout the presentation, an interactive audience feedback program, POPin, was used to collect and display live input from the audience. Attendees used their smartphones to answer eight questions regarding issues relevant to the Con Plan (using the college’s free wifi to avoid data charges). Attendees who did not have smart phones or did not wish to participate digitally were offered paper copies of the questions. Both the digital and paper versions were offered in English and Spanish.

Questions and feedback from the audience took up the bulk of the meeting time, with participants particularly interested in the housing and economic development sections. Toward the end of the meeting, attendees were given a set of ten dot stickers and asked to “vote” by placing the stickers on 21 posters naming activities that could be supported with grant funds. These 21 items were the top items previously identified by a 2017 survey in which over 1,800 people participated. Participants were also invited to add items, and two items were added.

The community members raised some issues for which the Con Plan funds cannot be used, such as the police and community special events.

### **Focus Groups**

Thirteen focus group discussions were held, targeting specific groups of stakeholders and their feedback. These groups included representatives of older adults, FamilySource Center communities, BusinessSource Centers, the Council District 9 Coalition, Comprehensive Housing Information & Referrals for People Living with AIDS/HIV (CHIRPLA) Provider Network, LA County Commission on HIV Consumer Caucus, Domestic Violence Alliance (DVA), Southern California Association of Nonprofit Housing (SCANPH), LA Workforce Development Board Taskforce on Underrepresented Populations, LA County Commission on HIV Planning, Priorities and Allocations Committee, High School Seniors, Philanthropy / Southern California Grant Makers, and Public Health Providers (arranged by Southern California Grant Makers). A total of 255 people attended the meetings to provide their insight.

These meetings were held from October through November 2019 and covered a wide range of topics, with respondents focusing mainly on topics relevant to them, but also touching on some universal issues within the city. Those issues included affordable housing, economic development, job training, homelessness prevention, shelters, and supportive services.

The focus group meetings allowed HCIDLA to hear specific voices that might have not been fully heard at a general public meeting and to gather perspective from specific groups that are directly affected by Con Plan funds or who have special insight due to the nature of their work with low-income residents.

### **Digital Survey**

From April 6 to May 5, the required 30-day public comment period, HCIDLA held a survey to gather feedback on the Mayor's proposed budget. A total of 598 people took the survey representing a fairly wide demographic range. To advertise the survey, HCIDLA used a variety of outreach methods, including mass email notification to about 25,000 subscribers, posting on the City's main website, the department's website, Twitter, Facebook and Instagram, and the City's Channel 35 television station. Moreover, HCIDLA also sent invitations to the Mayor's Office of Public Engagement, the City Council, Commissioners on six commissions, other City departments, the network of 99 Neighborhood Councils and at least 100 community-based organizations, as well as arranging for publication of an official notice in a daily periodical per HUD regulations. Outreach flyers were provided in English and Spanish.

The overall trend in survey responses indicates the high need for affordable housing, including assistance in buying a home using low interest loans. Among services, assistance for people experiencing homelessness ranked the highest. These trends have continued, as they were also emphasized in the public responses at recent prior public meetings, and may support a relationship between lack of affordable housing and rising homelessness. Moreover, infrastructure needs such as sidewalk reconstruction continues to rank second.

### **Special City Council Housing Committee Meeting**

During the special City Council Housing Committee Meeting on June 4, 2020, there was one verbal public comment that supported the Mayor's 2020-21 Consolidated Plan proposed budget, and three written public comments that supported a particular public facility improvement project.

### **Impact on Goal-Setting**

The public meeting, focus group and survey responses support the following top two priorities for lower-income Angelenos -- to develop and preserve affordable housing and to improve the infrastructure. In addition, investing in small businesses and job training and in services provided by community hubs like the FamilySource Systems, community centers, and homeless advocates would also support community advancement.

The 2020-21 Con Plan is closely aligned with the expressed interests of the public, as two-thirds of the grant funds are allocated to Housing and Neighborhood Improvements/Public Facilities. Social Services and Economic Development represent most of the remainder of the funding. By increasing the supply of affordable housing, addressing homelessness, and improving the local economy, more residents can escape poverty.
